## Message from Gary Dixon, Secretary-Treasurer

### PENSION RELIEF

On March 10, 2021, the US Congress passed the Coronavirus Relief Bill and President Biden signed that bill into law on March 11, 2021. In the bill was the Butch Lewis Emergency Pension Relief Act, which helps Multiemployer Pension Plans with financing. According to the Alaska Teamster Pension Plan's Actuary, Paul Graf of the firm Rael & Letson, our plan qualifies for such assistance. That is good news for our plan participants and retirees. How it will work and "ALL" the intricate details still remain. Here is what we know and what the criteria for qualifying are:

The Pension Benefit Guaranty Corporation (PBGC) will have 120 days to issue regulations for special financing assistance applications. During the first two years following the date of enactment, priority for applications will be given to plans that are:

- 1. Insolvent.
- 2. Likely to be one insolvent within 5 years.
- 3. Have a present value of over \$1 billion in unfunded bested benefits.
- 4. Have previously implemented benefit suspensions pursuant to the Multiemployer Pension Reform Act (MPRA).

We will wait for the actuary to let us know when we can apply.

Qualifying for Special Financial Assistance comes from having to satisfy one of the four criteria:

- 1. Plans in critical and declining status (not us),
- 2. Plans that were previously in critical and declining status that were approved for benefit suspension pursuant to the MPRA Application process (not us),
- 3. Plans in critical status with a funded percentage less than 40% on a current basis, and with active to inactive ratio less than 2 to 3 (we qualify),
- 4. Plans that became insolvent after December 16, 2014, that remain insolvent but yet have not yet terminated (not us).

As more information becomes available, we will let you know.

Please mark your calendar for the General Membership meetings on August 3rd in Fairbanks and August 5th in Anchorage because the Alaska Teamsters Pension Plan's Actuary, Paul Graf will be attending to give the Membership a presentation of the latest information on what the Butch Lewis Emergency Pension Relief does for our pension plan.

#### **NEW PROPERTY IN FAIRBANKS**

For the last 30+ years, our Local has rented office space for our Fairbanks Union Hall. The sad part is, we actually built and owned the very building we have been renting out of but, during the late 1980's we lost the building. Ever since, we've been renting a small portion in the old building we use to own. Through the years, for one reason or another, the Local never purchased another Fairbanks building.

This past year I have been watching the commercial real estate market in Fairbanks, figuring with the COVID-19 pandemic maybe some property would come on the market at a good price. Well, one finally did and soon after finding it, Eileen Whitmer, James McMilon, Kim Brandenburg and myself worked through our due-diligence process to make an offer to purchase—and it was ACCEPTED!

After closing the sale on the new Fairbanks property and some remodeling, our tentative move-in date will be the end of October 2021. We will have a ribbon-cutting celebration on November 2nd at the Fairbanks monthly General Membership meeting.

#### LOCAL 959 TURNS 80

This year we celebrate the Local's 80 year anniversary. From 1941-2021 we have represented Alaskans statewide. From Ketchikan to Prudhoe Bay, Teamsters Local 959 has the most diverse group of industries of any union in the state of Alaska. We are keeping our fingers crossed that this corona virus will let us have these three events to memorialize our longevity as one of the strongest Alaskan labor unions. ## DO YOU HAVE WHAT IT TAKES TO BE A SHOP STEWARD?

Shop Stewards play a vital role in the representation of our members. A successful Shop Steward must possess a number of traits, including: leadership abilities, good communication skills, and have the ability to put aside their own personal opinions to professionally and objectively represent all of our Teamster-represented members.

### What is a Shop Steward?

A Bargaining Unit's Shop Steward is the go-to Union Representative on the job site. They have a number of responsibilities from contract enforcement and assisting in grievance procedures, to keeping members informed and motivated about their Union. A Shop Steward:

- is familiar with your contract and can answer general questions;
- assists new employees in joining the Union and are knowledgeable about the benefits of being a member;
- is familiar with the grievance procedure and can direct you through the proper steps;
- is available to help you identify violations of the contract and can assist you in referencing sections of the contract;
- acts as a liaison between employees and the Union;
- understands problems and challenges facing your department/company and relays information to the Union;
- participates in contract negotiations;
- attends Union meetings and is kept current on Union-wide updates and labor issues.

## **IMPORTANT INFORMATION**

## **REMINDER FOR CONSTRUCTION CARD HOLDERS**

### $\sim$ A message from the Dispatch Department $\sim$

All "A" Construction Card members with out-of-work dates prior to July 1, 2021 who have worked less than 600 hours in the preceding 36 months, and "B" Construction Card members who have worked less than 80 hours in the preceding 36 months, are required to re-register their cards during the month of July (July 1 through July 31) in order to receive a July 1 out-of-work date. If re-registration takes place August 1, 2021 or after, the member will receive the date in which they appear in Dispatch to re-register.

This re-registration practice takes place every July for "A" and "B" Construction Card members who have not worked a total of 600 hours or 80 hours, respectively, in the preceding 3 year period.

Please remember to re-register your Construction Card by coming in to the Anchorage OR Fairbanks Dispatch office to have it stamped at least once every 90 days. Please note that it is 90 days, not 3 months! If the 90th day falls on a weekend or holiday, you will need to re-register the Friday before the weekend or the day before the holiday. Additionally, if you are on the Remote List, you <u>are</u> able to mail your card to the Anchorage OR Fairbanks Dispatch office to be stamped as long as it is postmarked within the 90 days.

## **BUSINESS REPRESENTATIVE REPORTS**

## UPDATES-STATEWIDE

### ~James McMilon, Business Representative (Fairbanks / North Slope)~

North Slope Update: 2021 Winter Season has certainly had it's challenges, between projects being put on hold as a result of Covid-19 and the resulting crash in oil prices. The North Slope is not in the renaissance period we were heading in just as recently as 1/1/2020.

Houston Contracting: Our members are currently working for Houston Contracting on the GMT-2 Pipeline Project which is in its second year of the two-year project. We have over 60 Teamsters on the job including four Construction Driver Apprentices and one Survey Apprentice.

The GMT-2 Pipeline Power & Fiber Installation Scope of Work-2021 Winter Construction Scope: The 2021 Winter construction scope consists of the demolition of 5,000 feet of existing 4" Raw Water Line and 54 existing VSMs, the installation of 1700 feet of 6".500 wall Raw Water Line and 47 VSMs, and the installation of 4 pipelines, power, and fiber from GMT1 to GMT2. 8.71 miles of 20", 14", 8", and 6" pipeline from GMT1 to GMT2 will be installed. The pipeline will be installed on existing VSMs.

AFC/NANUQ has built and maintained ice roads across the field including those for the GMT-2 Pipeline Project and Alpine Resupply ice road.

#### ~Jeremy Holan, Business Representative (Fairbanks / North Pole)~

Redi Mix in Fairbanks: We are currently starting negotiations with FS&G Redi Mix, H.C Redi Mix, and University Redi Mix. The current CBA's expire between March 2021 and July 2021. The negotiation committees will be meeting with each of the employers in hopes to have the new contracts in place before the concrete season begins.

School Busing: Fairbanks School Busing is going through some major changes. Durham School Bus Services was awarded the Fairbanks North Star Borough School District contract. We have been working with our members, making sure they get their applications in to the new bus contractor. Negotiations with Durham will start as soon as possible.

The negotiation process with First Student—Ketchikan starts soon as well. This will be Ketchikan's second time at the negotiations table. The Union is setting up pre-negotiation meetings with the group and coordinating negotiation dates with the Company.

April 1, 2021, we should know if First Student will be maintaining the Healy School District Contract. Once we find out, pre-negotiation meetings will be set with the bargaining unit and dates set with the Company.

White Mountain Beverage: We recently learned White Mountain Beverages dba K&L Distributors is being sold, it's still early in this process. Unexpected negotiations will take place with the new employer as soon as there's more information. Justin Lavatai was assigned as a Shop Steward in February. He also participated in the Shop Steward training class held on February 13, 2021.

UPS: Tony Higbee was assigned as a Shop Steward this past February. He participated in the Shop Steward training class held on February 13, 2021. Jeremy Espinosa, a senior UPS driver, also participated in the Shop Steward training as a guest to learn more about the role shop stewards have with Local 959.

Alaska Rail Road Corporation: Lengthy negotiations which were hindered by COVID-19 travel and group meeting restrictions were finally completed this past January. Our members across the state ratified the tentative agreement over 87%.

### ~Terri Quinlan, Business Representative (Anchorage / JBER)~

I am sure I am not alone when I say I have spent a lot of time discussing COVID issues during the past year. The contracts I represent are mostly communication based and the employees are considered essential workers. Though I haven't been able to spend much time interacting one on one with the members because of COVID, I am proud to say the members have diligently kept working and adapted to the daily changes made because of COVID. All essential workers deserve a pat on the back. Because many of our members travel frequently, we worked on issues related to the travel mandates. We also drafted agreements between the Union and the Company related to COVID. Although there were COVID related grievances filed, we were able to find resolutions to the problems prior to arbitrating. It's been an interesting year here at the Hall!

<u>~Yolandous Williams, Business Representative (Anchorage / Wasilla)~</u> Republic Parking: Due to COVID-19, we had nine members laid-off in the Airport operation. The remaining twelve members are doing a great job. We will be working on a new contract with the Company which ends November 30, 2021.

MV Transport: The Company had a reduction of 65% of their business due to COVID-19. We went from 77 to 40 members during the past year. Discussions with the Company on the contract will begin soon, which expires June 30, 2021. Normal operations have not yet resumed but the volume of work is slowly starting to rise.

UPS: This past year has been very busy in the face of COVID-19—150+ new employees were hired and given new hire orientations, 600+ part-time and full-time employees continue to cover the Anchorage-Wasilla area, and 200+ grievances were filed on behalf of our members. UPS has announced that our Gateway is scheduled to double in size over the next two years and there is also a new Gateway General Manager and management team. We are working hard during this transition to make sure our members are successful.

#### ~Jace Digel, Chief of Staff / Business Representative (Anchorage / Kodiak)~

AMEA is currently in negotiations for a wage opener. Genevieve Cook and Alison Horn are leading the negotiation team to reach an agreement.

Big Dreams Transport continues to grow now making runs out of Washington state to Alaska three times a week. Big dreams is going on it's 5th year as an owner-operator agreement with Teamsters Local 959.

The Covid-19 crisis hit Kodiak pretty bad, marking the Island the15th most infectious city in the nation at one time last year. Fortunately, all of our members stayed working and employment was only minimally affected. We had a handful of people who were infected with Covid (continued on page 9)

and were able to take advantage of the FFCRA leave. All of the companies in our bargaining units were very understanding and accommodated the workers in such situations.

I can't believe it's already time to start negotiations with Choctaw Defense Services (CDS). We're looking to start the process this summer and hopefully have it ratified by December 2021. Recently, the Dept. of Labor awarded our CDS members back pay for misclassification of labor as well as shorted OT.

Brechan Construction worked last summer until October, hauling rock for the new barge dock for Lynden. They're currently closed for the season and we are waiting to see what 2021 brings for construction work on Kodiak Island.

Casillas Partners LLC is the new contractor awarded the Commissary support contract at the Coast Guard base on Kodiak (previously held by Trusted Hand Service, Inc.). We are currently in negotiations for a three year contract.

UPS workers deserve a big handshake and a word of gratitude. These hard working members were on the front lines of the pandemic delivering packages to ensure timely arrivals of goods to our doors. At one time, UPS saw a 40% increase in package count nationwide and, of course, the increase package numbers trickles down to our local guys. They didn't get any extra pay or extra benefits, just lots and lots of overtime and some drivers worked a grueling 60+ hours/week, week after week after week. So, when you see that Teamster in brown just remember, they're one of many hero's we call essential service employees.

Weaver Bros., Inc.-Kenai is steaming along. We agreed on a one year contract to get over the Covid hurdle. We will meet again and negotiate the contract this summer.

I would like to use this space to thank all the members I represent. I would also like to say a big, huge Thank You to all the Stewards out there. I know what it's like to be in your shoes and understand the challenges you face daily as Stewards. The job can be emotionally rewarding and at the same time very thankless. In this role you can be a hero or a zero and some members will have no problem letting you know which. You see, without you Stewards doing what you do in the field, we could not do what we do. You are the first responders to members' crisis, the defender against disciplinary actions, a shield against contract violations, fielder of questions/concerns or just an ear to yell at and maybe a much needed friend. Lynden Transport: On July 17, 2020, Teamsters working under City Driver and Linehaul contracts ratified 4 year statewide agreements. Benefits include a 7% overall increase in wages, continued pension contributions, and health care. Thank you to the negotiation team members-Steven Dinkins, William Hess, Joe Wiedman and Cole Sterner.

United Freight: The Collective Bargaining Agreement was ratified on August 18, 2020, and fully executed on September 1, 2020. It is a 4 year agreement from July 1, 2020—June 30, 2024. There were substantial changes to the pay steps that gave employees an annual anniversary increase in addition to a calendar year increase. Pay Increases are as following:

- July 1, 2020 \$0.35/hour \$0.70/hour
- July 1, 2021 July 1, 2022/23 \$0.35/hour

Double pay on Sunday went from the beginning of fourth year employment to third year employment. Vacation Accrual of 174 hours per year at the completion of 15 years of service is now at the completion of 10 years of service, with continued pension contributions and health care. Thank you to the negotiation team members—Ray Fine, Jeff Freeman, and Vince Cruz.

### ~LyDette Kieffer, Business Representative (Homer)~

At South Peninsula Hospital, we survived the first six months after our Chief Shop Steward, Maria Soto, retired. We appointed a new Chief, Katie Watson, who has been at the hospital for over ten years and has served as a steward for many of those years. To fill the space left by Maria, we were fortunate to have Holley Hightower return to Homer and step back into the steward position quite nicely! We continue to work through this year and look forward to returning to "normal" times soon.

In spite of the snowy weather, COVID-19 and all the social distancing, we have managed to stay busy with members and Shop Stewards. There is much concern about the ongoing situation from the pandemic although none of our members here have been laid off or lost their jobs over the past year. We have worked together to come up with creative staffing and accommodations for the folks who are at a higher risk. COVID-19 vaccines have been made available to all staff involved with patient care.

#### ~Derek Musto, Business Representative (Anchorage / Wasilla)~

Alaska Railroad Corporation: In January 2021 our bargaining committee completed a lengthy negotiation process and ratified a new three year agreement. Negotiations were significantly hindered by the COVID-19 pandemic and created new challenges in communicating with our members due to the limitation of travel and group meeting restrictions. The Alaska Railroad is a state-wide agreement with members across the state working along the rail belt from Fairbanks to Anchorage as well as other locations like Whittier and Seward.

ASD: In January of 2021 I began representing our membership in three new contracts with the Anchorage School District (Food Service, Warehouse and Maintenance and Bus Drivers and Attendants). Since then I have been out meeting members all over the municipality and getting ready to renegotiate two new contracts. Locations are broke down into three groups: Food Service who are cafeteria

workers that stock, prep, cook, serve and sometimes deliver food and meals at over 80 locations in schools of all sizes from Girdwood to Birchwood. Our Food Service members are also responsible for work in the general food service warehouse and central kitchen where many meals are prepped, cooked and received. Warehouse and Maintenance technicians work multiple shifts and can be found supporting all of the District's parking lots, buildings and property so most likely you have seen them and didn't even know it. Our Members under this contract maintain our auditoriums, AV equipment, electronics, automotive and vehicle fleet, heavy equipment, and playground equipment. Many more Teamsters work in the general warehouse, Student Nutrition, the mechanical department, drive trucks and loaders, and do work in a number of other classifications and work units. And, last, but not least, our School Bus Drivers and Attendants that are responsible for transporting our most precious cargo every day and transport our children to and from school. 2021 will be a busy year at ASD as we are currently getting ready to go into contract negotiations with both Food Service and School Bus. Assorted through this page are some of our members that I've encountered in my many bargaining unit visits.

**First Student:** The last year Covid-19 has been hard on our economy and like many other industries our members were significantly impacted. It is not uncommon for employees in the school bus industry to use unemployment benefits for school breaks and summer months so when schools started shutting down it was all hands on deck to represent our members and work to keep them paid and informed of the continual changes and limited options in their industry. Local 959 lobbied our elected officials, testified at school board meetings and secured 4 hours of pay each day for our Mat-Su First Student members while schools were shut down and employees were unable to work due to pupil transportation not being required. These efforts continued by Teamster officials all over the state for our membership outside of the Mat-Su, unfortunately, our efforts were not successful in other areas. This benefit in Mat-Su helped bargaining unit members maintain future unemployment benefits and addressed immediate financial needs for many at a time most people were out of work. Over the last year Local 959 representatives have worked to maintain communication with our school bus members and continue dialog with both school bus contractors and our elected officials to improve members safety, pay and working conditions.

### ~Thor Brown, Business Representative (Anchorage / JBER / King Salmon)~

**K&L Distributors** has been sold to a company owned by Junior Bridgeman. Mr. Bridgeman is a former NBA player and business owner in the lower 48. The new company will be bridging our current agreement and no jobs will be lost. We look forward to working with our new partner in the future.

#### ~ A Message from Mike Littlefield, North Slope Shop Steward ~

"The '20-'21 winter construction season has been challenging. The mask mandates and social distancing requirements have made the North Slope work even more difficult than normal. Working for Houston Contracting as a Teamster Shop Steward on the ConocoPhillips GMT-2 project has enabled me to represent my fellow Teamster union members in contract, jurisdictional, and even conflict resolution issues. I have worked with new apprentices along with long time journeymen alike, proudly representing our union and membership."

#### Training Trust Course Schedule

Alaska Teamster-Employer Service Training Trust (ATESTT) is a multi-employer collectively bargained plan that provides training to its eligible plan participants.

**Eligibility:** To be eligible for training through the ATESTT you must be a current Teamsters Local 959 member who is or has worked for an ATESTT contributing employer for at least 400 hours or more within any five-month period within the previous 24 months. To determine your eligibility, you must obtain your Work History from the Local 959 Dispatch Hall and provide it to the Training Trust when inquiring. <u>Note: Not all Teamster employer contracts contribute to ATESTT</u>.

To continue to meet the CDC, State of Alaska, and local requirements; the Training Trust is conducting our regular training programs in smaller

groups. We also conduct individual training programs as needed by appointment. Because classes may need to be rescheduled on short notice, we do not have a published schedule at this time. At the bottom of that page, you can register to receive email notifications. ## DOT NEW DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION REGULATION COMMERCIAL DRIVER & PERMIT HOLDER'S ALERT ~ A message from the Training Trust ~

Have you registered for the FMCSA Drug & Alcohol Clearinghouse? It is a Federal mandatory requirement whether you have a <u>CDL Permit or</u> <u>a CDL</u> required by <u>January 6, 2020</u>. Any newly permitted or licensed drivers since 1/6/20 must register. Regardless of your employment status, you are required to register. If you've already registered, no further action is required. You must register as a Driver or you may be subject to fines. Employers are obligated to conduct pre-employment and annual queries on their drivers. Training providers, prior to performing safety-sensitive functions including training or skills testing, or upgrading a CDL, are also required to register. We are required to query the Clearinghouse to determine drug and alcohol program violation information for any commercial permit holder or licensed commercial driver PRIOR to attending ANY commercial driving courses.

At this time, we do not need any additional information from you. We will review your status with compliance when we have training or testing available for you.

### Drug Testing Requirements for CDL & CLP Holders

Per FMCSA regulations, the Training Trust and its subsidiary, CEE, are required to conduct DOT Drug Testing for all individuals attending any commercial driver training or testing. What this means for you:

- Prior to attending ANY driver program, you must be registered in the FMCSA Drug & Alcohol Clearinghouse if you hold a CDL or CDL Permit (CLP)
- The Training Trust is obligated and must conduct a query in the Clearinghouse prior to attendance.
- Prior to attending training or skills testing, we will create a referral form and provide you the DOT Drug Screen testing appointment.
- Once we receive the Negative Test Results; then driver training and/or testing appointments can be made.
